## One Minnesota: Integration, Achievement, & Equity for the 21st Century

## **Defining Integration:**

Integration is:

- 1. The absence of racial isolation of protected class students sustained over time in schools,
- 2. Academic achievement that is supported by a multicultural, culturally responsive curriculum and environment,
- 3. Diverse teaching staff,
- 4. Access to opportunity by leveling racial and socioeconomic barriers
- 5. Collaboration with other districts and schools to promote voluntary practices, replicate best practice and efficiency,
- 6. Culturally inclusive parent engagement,
- 7. Provides access to rigor and opportunity within and beyond the K-12 setting.
- 8. Develops the cultural competence of learners from all races and prepares them to thrive in our interdependent communities and global economy.

## **Priorities & Beliefs:**

- 1. A return to segregation eliminates opportunity for all students.
- 2. Integration is a vital strategy that promotes has social and academic benefits, increases cultural competence of learners, and fosters the ability to solve complex problems.
- 3. Not funding integration leads to an unfunded mandate that does not compel or encourage school districts to achieve integration.
- 4. Narrowly tailor uses of the revenue to innovative and effective programs and opportunities that achieve racial and socioeconomic integration <u>and</u> academic achievement as measured by MCA's and other measures.
- 5. School choice and voluntary measures are valued by Minnesotans and should be supported.
- 6. Parent engagement, choice, and support is essential for student academic success and should be supported at the local level through this revenue.
- 7. Programs developed should be aligned to the definition and have the institutional support. MDE should develop a rubric of acceptable uses within the definition provided.
- 8. Accountability, oversight, and monitoring must be done effectively by MDE and local districts.
- 9. Area Learning Centers should be included within the rule and qualify for integration revenue.
- 10. Locally developed plans and budgets, that meet the clearly defined parameters of *One Minnesota* revenue, is an important component to successful implementation, accountability and oversight.
- 11. Create a fiscal model that eliminates waste, duplication of services, maximizes efficiency, and addresses disparities while meeting the unique needs of communities is critical.

## Develop a fiscal model that achieves the following:

- 1. Eliminates the disparity between the amount of revenue that districts are eligible to receive over time.
- 2. Reflects the growing needs and diversity of Greater Minnesota.
- 3. Provides transportation for school choice.
- 4. Increases efficiency, reduces duplication
- 5. Benefits all of Minnesota schools.
- 6. Does not increase (and may lower) cost of the current program.
- 7. Increases oversight and accountability.
